I begin this year's Presidents report with a strong sense of optimism and purpose. As we move further away from a pandemic that severely impacted us all in various ways, we can now see our great city, region and state coming back to life with plenty forecast growth on the horizon.

It is fair to say however, the last 12 months for the Chamber, our members and the community has been challenging in many ways and in true spirit we have pulled through.

With a great a committee, that you as members elected last year, I am very proud to acknowledge that they have worked tirelessly to position the Chamber to provide many benefits to its members and the greater business community within the Devonport region.

Building on the initial work that commenced last year with our late President Eric Mobbs, I am pleased to report that we have successfully executed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Devonport City Council that is already delivering membership benefits. The MOU provides both financial support and the use of Council meeting rooms for the Chambers, meetings and functions. During the past year we have undertaken over 10 events with more than 400 people having already enjoyed the great networking opportunities. Breakfast networking meetings with guest speakers are now scheduled every two weeks.

It is great to see the Council's Living City project finally being completed with the final pieces of the project being the \$17 million waterfront park and the privately funded \$49 million hotel. This new iconic "Novotel" brand Hotel right on the waterfront is not only a great landmark for our city, but also shows the confidence that the Accor brand



has in the Devonport region.

This additional accommodation along with the great conference facilities being offered in the Paranaple Centre, will be a game changer for our city and members. If I may say so "the critics and knockers may have knocked, but Council has delivered".

The return of Rex Airlines to Devonport since 2005 will add an additional 40,000 seats to the Melbourne-Devonport sector and drive some much needed competition into the market. This will be a great benefit to locals, business travellers and tourists.

The Chamber has actively participated in the Council's tourism and retail strategies and held a number of breakfasts where the outcomes have been presented to our members and wider community. In speaking about the wider community, I am very pleased to report that we are now seeing a greater number of non-members now attending our functions to learn more about a specific topic or issue.

As a Chamber we have been recognised as business leaders and have hosted and attended several roundtable meetings with both the current Federal government and opposition members who have sought our advice and input into the current jobs skills shortage across all sectors for our region.

As we go forward into the new year, we will have a new Council to work with, along with new State and Federal government policies and legislation that will be debated and come into law. We look forward to actively working with all levels of government for and on behalf of our members.

It has been a busy year for the Executive team, and I am also pleased to report that a number of our Executives are active members in other committees outside the Chamber encompassing, skills and jobs, tourism, retail and hospitality, including representation on the State's Chamber of Commerce that provides us with many benefits. Auditors report on the financial report

No opinion is expressed as to whether the accounting policies as described in Note 1, are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. These Auditing Standards require that we comply with ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit also involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the risks of material misstatement of the financial report whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments , the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

The financial report has been prepared for distribution to members for the purposes of fulfilling the committee's financial reporting under the Associations Incorporation Act 1964 (Tas.). We disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the financial report to which it relates to any person other than the members, or for any purpose other than that for which it was prepared.

Our audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our procedures included examination on a test basis of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the financial report, and the evaluation of significant accounting estimates. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion whether, in all material respects, the financial report is presented fairly in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1, so as to present a view which is consistent with our understanding of the association's financial position and performance as represented by the results of its operations.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion

Independence

In conducting our audit we have complied with the independence requirements of Australian professional ethical pronouncements

Qualification

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practicable for the organisation to maintain an effective system of internal control over income activities until their initial entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, our audit in relation to income activities was limited to amounts recorded.

Audit opinion

Subject to the qualification noted above, we report that:-

- The accompanying financial report presents fairly in all material respects the financial position of Devonport Chamber of Commerce & Industry Inc as at 30/06/2022 and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements.
- The accounting and other records required to be kept in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Act 1964 (Tas.) and the association's constitution have been properly kept.
- The rules relating to the administration of the affairs and funds of the association have been observed and explanations required in the performance of the audit have been obtained.

Note 1: Statement of significant accounting policies

a. This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (Tas.) 1964. The committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Tas.) 1964 and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 1031: Materiality

AASB 110: Events after the Balance Sheet Date

The financial report is prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the association in the preparation of the financial report. The policies have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost. Depreciable items are depreciated over their expected useful life using the diminishing value.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

The association is exempt from income tax under section 23(h) of the Income Tax Assessment Act (1997).

Grant income

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when it is controlled. When there are conditions attached to grant revenue relating to the use of those grants for specific purposes it is recognised in the balance sheet as a liability (Grants Unexpended) until such conditions are met or services provided.

Goods and services tax (GST)

The net amount of GST recoverable from or payable to the Australian Taxation Office is included as a current asset or a current liability respectively in the balance sheet.

Members' Guarantee

The club is incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act 1964. If it is wound up, the rules of the club state that each member is required to make a contribution towards any outstanding liabilities.


