It is an honour to present to all members, this Annual Report; my first as your President but more significantly, the Chamber's 84th. Eighty-four years is a marvellous innings for any organisation, and it's appropriate I start by acknowledging the effort of all of those who have served on the Executive during that time; men and women who have sacrificed their own time and family time, for the benefit of this great city and its business community.

I'd like to extend the same gratitude to our current Executive, not least of all for their support during my first year as President. I have conservatively estimated that between one monthly meeting and at least two other events each month, as well as all the advocacy and planning which goes on in the background, we collectively volunteer more than 40 hours per week or 2,000 hours per year.

At the time I stood for President a year ago – reluctantly at first and encouraged by members past and present – we had three clear priorities for the year ahead.

Firstly, we wanted to develop a strategic plan, so our time and money would be spent where it had the most impact.

Secondly, we wanted to increase and diversify our membership so our ideas and opinions, were well informed and representative of the business community. Finally, we wanted to strengthen our advocacy efforts and relationship with all three tiers of government, so that we could positively influence and work with them for your benefit.

Based on the outcomes detailed elsewhere in this report, I think everybody would agree we achieved all three of these objectives and more. A highlight for me personally, was our strategic planning session, where more than sixty members and city leaders packed Empress Bar in an air that was charged with optimism, shaping the strategic plan via their smartphones. Another was when Council at its August Meeting, unanimously supported a new partnership agreement; providing us with 3-years' funding compared to the initial 2-year period, and this time with annual increases built in. It's an arrangement other chambers would be envious of, and signifies in a very tangible way, the mutual respect which exists between Council, DCCI and our members.

Council is our most important partner, and it's appropriate that we also recognise their achievements over the past year, with the opening of the Sound and Light show and Devonport being named Australia's Top Tourism Town, as just two examples of their long-term vision, and Living City project, which continues to pay dividends.

Having said all of this, it is our members of course – the business owners of Devonport – who have worked the hardest and deserve the most recognition in a report like this. Running a business is an enormous responsibility and a challenging and often thankless task, generally even more so in regional areas. The past year has brought its own challenges, with the interest rate increases of last year flowing through the system and dampening consumer spending. Many of our members have reported doing it tough, and I have made it clear during all my meetings with the Premier, the Leader of the Opposition, Ministers and Shadow Minister. While this isn't to be made light of, overall, there is a characteristically Devonport sense of optimism. Our members businesses don't give up easily, and even though times are tough in many sectors, everywhere I go locally and across Tasmania, there is a sense that Devonport is on the up. It's remarkable, really. It inspires me, and it keeps this city alive. "Living City" is so much more than a project, or a catch phrase. It is us. It is now. And the best is yet to come.

Premier's Message

I would like to thank and congratulate the Devonport Chamber of Commerce for its continued advocacy work and the support it provides to both business and community groups in Devonport, as well as the broader region.

The Tasmanian Government continues to ensure that Tasmania remains the best place to live, work and raise a family. This is why under our 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania's Future, we are continuing our record investment in housing, infrastructure and workforce development, as well as supporting industry and the community by providing cost-of-living relief.

The Tasmanian economy continues to be one of the strongest in the nation, supported by our record low unemployment rates and nationleading annual wage growth. Tasmania's VET completion rates are also some of the highest in the country. It is our skilled workforce which will help the region unlock its full potential, across a range of industries both current and emerging.

My Government is committed to supporting Tasmanians with cost-of-living pressures, and the delivery Marinus Link will support this commitment. Not only will the project deliver lower electricity prices, but the project is expected to create significant employment and economic stimulus, especially on the Nort-West Coast. We expect the benefits of this investment to flow over into various industries in and around Devonport, supporting businesses and the community more broadly.

Through our 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania's Future, we will continue to invest in and support the region and provide the region with the certainty it needs to continue to thrive.

Once again, I would like to thank the Devonport Chamber of Commerce for its ongoing contributions to the region. I congratulate the Chamber on its successful year and wish the Chamber all the best in the year ahead.


